

Organisations associated with the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games

- **Beijing 2008** is the official website of the Beijing 2008 Olympic and Paralympic Games and there is a link to the website on the links page of the Olympic Lottery Distributor site.
- **The British Olympic Association (BOA)** is the British representative of the Olympic movement and is responsible for British participation in Summer and Winter Games.
- **The British Paralympic Association (BPA)** is responsible for selecting, preparing, funding and managing Britain's competitors at the Paralympic Games. Its interests are represented by the BOA on the Olympic Board.
- **Camelot** is the operator of the UK National Lottery. It raises money for Good Causes as designated by Parliament. It does not distribute or award these funds but is responsible for managing the infrastructure of the National Lottery – i.e. in relation to the people playing the Lottery.
- **The Commission for a Sustainable London 2012 (CSL)** is an independent body tasked with ensuring that the London 2012 Games are the most sustainable games to date. It is the first time such a body has been set up in the history of the Games. CSL reports directly to the Olympic Board.
- **The Government Olympic Executive (GOE)** is responsible for coordinating the work of all Government Departments to achieve the wider legacy benefits of the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games. It is located within the **Department for Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS)**, which is the Government department with responsibility for Lottery Funding.
- **The Greater London Authority (GLA)** is made up of a directly elected Mayor – the Mayor of London – and a separate elected assembly – the London Assembly. The Mayor of London, together with the London 2012 Organising Committee and the BOA, is jointly responsible for delivering the Games under the terms of the Host City contract, agreed with the IOC.
- **The International Olympic Committee (IOC)** is an international, non governmental, non profit organisation and the creator of the Olympic Movement. The IOC owns the rights to the Olympic symbols, flags, motto, anthem and Olympic Games and its primary responsibility is to supervise the organisation of the Summer and Winter Olympic Games.
- **The International Paralympic Committee (IPC)** is the global governing body of the Paralympic Movement. The IPC organises the Summer and Winter Paralympic Games and serves as the International Federation for 13 sports, for which it supervises and coordinates the World Championships and other competitions.

- **Legacy Trust UK** is a new charitable trust to support a diverse range of cultural and sporting initiatives throughout the UK associated with the London 2012 Olympic Games and Paralympic Games. It is funded by the Big Lottery Fund, Arts Council England and the DCMS.
- **The London Development Agency (LDA)** is one of nine Regional Development Agencies established by the Government to promote regeneration and economic development in England. The LDA co-funded the bid for London to host the London 2012 Games with the DCMS.
- **Local Authorities: The London Boroughs of Hackney; Newham; Tower Hamlets and Waltham Forest** have, along with **Lea Valley Regional Park**, guaranteed to make the land under their control available for the Olympic Park. They have collectively worked with the **London Borough of Greenwich**, which is also a host Borough, the GLA, the LDA and the ODA, to obtain the necessary planning permissions.
- **The London Organising Committee of the Olympic Games and Paralympic Games Ltd (LOCOG)** is a limited company responsible for organising the Games on behalf of the Olympic Movement under the terms of the Host City Contract. LOCOG will receive funding from the private sector and is expected to raise £2bn through sponsorship, broadcasting rights, merchandising and selling tickets. LOCOG will also receive public funding for the costs of the Paralympic Games.
- **London 2012** is the official website and brand of the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games.
- **The National Lottery Commission (NLC)** is responsible for licensing and regulating the National Lottery.
- **National Lottery Good Causes** is the website which contains information about all the Good Causes which the National Lottery supports.
- **The Olympic Board** comprises the Olympics Minister, representing the Government's and the ODA's interests, the Mayor of London and the Chairs of LOCOG and the BOA. Its meetings are attended by the chair of the ODA. The Olympic Board has oversight of the entire London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic project and is responsible for coordinating the work of LOCOG and the ODA, resolving and determining issues raised by members and ensuring a sustainable legacy following the Games.
- **The Olympic Delivery Authority (ODA)** is the body responsible for creating the new venues and infrastructure required for the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games.
- **The Olympic Lottery Distributor (OLD)** is an independent body set up by Parliament which uses money raised by the National Lottery to fund the delivery of the 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games.
- **Sport England** is a Government agency which advises, invests in and promotes community sport throughout England. Its aim is to get two million people more active in sport by 2012

and Sport England will be working with a range of partners to help ensure that the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games deliver a lasting sporting legacy.

- **Sport Northern Ireland** is the lead facilitator in the development of sport in Northern Ireland.
- **Sport Scotland** is the national agency for sport in Scotland.
- **Sports Council for Wales** is the main adviser on sporting matters to the Welsh Assembly Government. Responsible for distributing funds from the National Lottery to sport in Wales.
- **UK Sport** works in partnership with the home country sports councils and other agencies to lead sport in the UK to world-class success.
- **Vancouver 2010** is the website containing information on the Winter Olympic and Paralympic Games to be held in Vancouver, Canada in 2010.
